Methodology

Patrick E. Gonzales graduated from the University of Baltimore in 1981 with a degree in political science. He is the former president of Mason-Dixon Campaign Polling and Gonzales/Arscott Research & Communications, Inc.

Over the past two decades, Mr. Gonzales has polled and analyzed hundreds of elections in Maryland. Additionally, he and his associates have conducted numerous market research projects and crafted message development programs for businesses and organizations throughout the state.

This survey was conducted by *Gonzales Research & Marketing Strategies* from March 19th through March 22nd, 2007. A total of 820 registered voters in Maryland who vote regularly were interviewed by telephone. A crosssection of interviews was conducted in each jurisdiction within the state to reflect general election voting patterns.

The margin for error, according to customary statistical standards, is no more than plus or minus 3.5 percentage points. There is a 95 percent probability that the "true" figures would fall within this range if the entire survey universe were sampled. The margin for error is higher for any demographic subgroup, such as gender, race or party affiliation.

Summary


Living Wage

Support for a "living wage" bill in Maryland continues to climb. Statewide, 71% of Maryland voters today (compared to 63% in December 2003) say they would favor a state law requiring businesses with large state contracts to pay their workers at least \$23,500 annually, while 18% say they are opposed to a law requiring this, with 11% offering no opinion.

By party, 83% of Democrats, 65% of independents and 52% of Republicans say they favor a bill to require businesses with large state contracts to pay their workers at least \$23,500 annually.

Eighty-seven percent of black voters support a "living wage" bill, as do 66% of whites.

Additionally, a majority of voters in every region of the state say they favor a "living wage" bill.





QUESTION: Montgomery County, Prince George's County, and Baltimore City have passed "living wage" laws that require companies with large municipal services contracts to pay their workers at least \$23,500. Would you favor or oppose a state law requiring businesses with large state contracts to pay their workers a similar "living wage"?
